

## OACGP Progress Update: June 2026

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### Multiyear Grant Cycle # 2 Overview

The second Multiyear Grant Cycle includes **24** awards totaling **\$3,405,265** over two years. These awards support sustained community-based responses to opioid use disorder and substance use disorder across New Hampshire.

OACGP Multiyear funding is designed to support larger, longer-term projects that expand service access, strengthen local capacity, and improve coordination across prevention, treatment, recovery, harm reduction, and community capacity-building efforts. This second cycle completes the multiyear grant component of OACGP, which was implemented through two cohorts. Together, the two cohorts represent a sustained investment in opioid abatement strategies across New Hampshire.

#### Geographic Reach

The funding portfolio supports work across urban, rural, regional, and statewide service areas. Funded projects reach communities throughout New Hampshire, including areas where access to treatment, recovery supports, harm reduction services, transportation, and coordinated care remains limited.

Several awards support multi-county or regional approaches, while others focus on specific communities with significant local need. This mix allows OACGP to invest in both place-based strategies and broader systems-level capacity.

## Funding Domain Distribution

The Multiyear Grant Cycle 2 portfolio reflects broad alignment across all five OACGP domains. Many projects address more than one domain, recognizing that effective opioid abatement work often requires coordinated supports across multiple systems.

**Recovery is the most represented domain, with 17 funded projects.** Prevention and Community Capacity Building are each represented in 16 projects. Treatment is represented in 15 projects, and Harm Reduction is represented in 12 projects.

Together, these investments support peer recovery services, treatment access, overdose prevention, youth and family prevention strategies, case management, community health worker models, coordinated referral pathways, family treatment court supports, transportation assistance, housing stabilization, and regional response infrastructure

## Portfolio Impact

The Multiyear Grant Cycle 2 portfolio is intended to expand access to low-barrier services, strengthen connections between providers, and support people and families affected by opioid use disorder and substance use disorder during high-risk periods.

Funded projects serve populations including individuals with OUD/SUD and co-occurring mental health needs, people experiencing homelessness, justice-involved individuals, pregnant and parenting women, youth and young adults, kinship families, children affected by parental substance use, rural residents, and people who are not consistently connected to traditional health care or behavioral health systems.

The strength of the portfolio is its balance of immediate service delivery and longer-term infrastructure. Awards support direct assistance for individuals and families while also building the partnerships, workforce capacity, referral systems, and local coordination needed to sustain opioid abatement efforts over time.
